

Deanery Synod Report 2021/22

The Deanery synod have met 3 times on zoom this year. In summer there were Diocesan synod elections. Clergy representatives are now Revd Karen Bradley and Revd Alex Mann. Laity representatives are Mr John Atkin, Miss Ailsa Cooling, Mr John Cooper, Mrs Di Fretwell, Mr James Taylor and Dr Allan Voice.

Deanery newsletters have been distributed highlighting good news stories that share information ideas and initiatives across the churches in the area.

The new vision for the diocese has been an ongoing topic in meetings. Revd Karen Bradley gave an update of where Bishop Libby feels the deanery needs to aspire towards. This is much in line with the national church.

We had opportunity to explore what churches in the area are doing well within the 5 Marks of mission and how this works within diocesan vision statement.

Each parish are encouraged to decide how to implement the vision at local level. Training will be offered when needs at the "coal face" have been clearly identified.

Deployment across the deanery is on continual review. Recruitment and legal processes for a 3rd Archdeacon are underway. The date of creation for the three new Archdeaconries is planned for 6th June 2022.

Bishop Libby held two events for the deanery in October where congregations could have informal Q and A with officers from Church house. St Bartholomew's Clay Cross hosted one of these evenings. Bishop Libby also has an open Invite to join a community of prayer in the lead up to the Diocese centenary in 2027.

The Safeguarding strategy 2022-25 has been presented with the aim that everyone involved with church will take responsibility and have appropriate training in care and protection of children, young people and adults involved in church.

The Diocese of Derby has adopted the House of Bishops' Safeguarding Policy, 'Promoting a Safer Church'.

Clay Cross Bellringers Report 2021/22

Unfortunately, the struggles which started with Covid restrictions seem to be continuing. This has meant we have rarely rung all six bells, except for one wedding and one service since Covid began. We have been mainly concentrating on between one and three bells for most Sunday services, (when regular helpers can assist). We do also try to continue to practice regularly even if we only have three or four ringers available.

At present masks are still encouraged, due to the poor air flow in the ringing chamber: so apologies to everyone on the tea and coffee rota, whilst we continue to have the back door open a little longer.

We rang for one wedding last year and have one booked for this June.

So what did else we achieved

We have managed to ring most permitted Sundays, even if we only tolled due to the restrictions in force.

In April 2021 we managed to join the national ringing, (ringing two bells) following the death of HRH Prince Phillip, we also managed to ring for Remembrance Sunday, remembering those who had died during the Pandemic Remembrance Service, Christmas morning, plus more recently Mothering Sunday and Easter Sunday in 2022.

November saw us ring for Remembrance Sunday, half muffled as usual. Our muffles are starting to show signs of age, so if you know anyone who decides to replace their carpet, (where there is still some pile left in parts of their old one), please let us know just in case we need it for implementation of 'Operation London Bridge'... hopefully not this year, with all the Jubilee celebrations to look forward to.

Looking forward, I would hate the bells to become silent due to a lack of ringers; so, we really do need new recruits. If you would like a new hobby, (especially if you can persuade a friend / family to come as well), then please contact me to discuss this further, or simply turn up to our Friday night practice 7:30pm, we are a friendly bunch: it's fun, cheap and there is no age limit. You don't have to be musical, it's good for your mental and physical health: gentle stretching, once you have learnt the basics, though it may feel like a workout initially and memorising the patterns plus listening for your bell helps with mental well-being.
